REPORT OF SELECTMEN.

To the Town of Rutland:

Your selectmen report that their duties, for causes well known to all, have been unusually arduous during the past year, requiring the appropriation of a great deal of time and a large amount of money, over and above the ordinary current expenses of the town. This extraordinary sum, caused in consequence of the war, and the raising of volunteers, will be cheerfully borne by the patriotic citizens of the town. We are happy to be able to report that you have filled your quota of nine months' men without resort to a draft.

Your quota was large, which, to raise, your selectmen have paid, in bounties, agreeable to a vote of the town, the sum of \$16,806.68, together with interest up to this time, which is to be paid in four installments, viz: \$5,000 the 15th of July, 1864; \$5,000 the 15th of July, 1865; \$5,000 the 15th of July, 1866, and the balance \$1,806.58 the 15th of July, next, with interest semi-annually. This will afford great relief inasmuch as the taxes for this year are to be unusually large, especially the State tax. Among the extraordinary claims caused by suits brought against the town by Steele & Russell, the Banks of Middlebury and Poultney, which you are all familiar with, were settled last year, but has not all been paid. The past year the Bank of Middlebury have been paid, in full, the sum of \$8,441.69,

for which we loaned the surplus money received by the town, under the census of 1860, to the amount of \$8,000. There is still due the Bank of Poultney \$1,496.84, and Steele & Russell \$1,332.00, payable the 15th of July next. Also, \$1,000 due Steele & Russell payable the 15th of July, 1864, with interest. Due Bank of Poultney \$1,120.00 payable the 15th of July, 1864, and \$1,060.00, due the 15th of July, 1865.

We have, under the advice of counsel, settled the claim of J. Huntoon for breach of contract in relation to the Town Hall, on two suits, and paid him \$200.

We have also settled up the claim of town of Mendon against this town, for what Mendon had to pay for the support of Jackson, a pauper, temporarily relieved by said Mendon, said pauper being chargeable upon this town and paid Mendon there for \$130.00.

There has been no suits brought in favor or against the town the past year. The suits in court in which the town are interested were not tried during the past year, for the reason that the chief judge of the court resides in town, therefore could not try said causes.

We have during the past year laid out but one new road, and that but a short distance, in Edsonville, to make the ways there a public street, and have laid out about \$30 thereon. About \$50 more will be required on said street to make it in good condition, (no land damage paid.) The highway from near the Depot to Mr. Moulthrope's, laid out two years ago, has been only partially worked, inasmuch as there seemed an unusual amount to be provided for the past year. We have laid out on said highway about \$520.

At the north end of the Curtis bridge we have found it necessary to expend about \$140 in wharfing up to preserve the bridge and highway. Upon the highways and bridges, generally, we have found it only necessary to make the or-

dinary amount of appropriations and they are now in more than middling repair.

We would advise that during the next year East Creek bridge be shingled or slated for its future preservation. We are not aware of any extraordinary demand for outlays upon highways except the completion of the Moulthrop road, which we would recommend to be built this season.

REPORT OF THE OVERSEER OF THE POOR.

The Overseer closed his account on the 13th day of February, and paid all outstanding claims against his department, up to that date, excepting the Superintendent of the Farm, who

You have also herewith a list of persons who have received assistance outside the poor house, the amount to each name, and the cause for rendering such aid. There have been many cases of sickness, and a large number precluded their removal to the poor house. There have been admitted to the poor house during the year 53 different persons, and the average number through the year has been 27. There are now in the poor house 26, 11 adults and 15 children. There has been buried in all 13; and the amount of sickness among the poor has been nearly the same as last year. Ten burials at the expense of the town.

Your Overseer has had due regard for the constant demand upon your Treasury. But the expense of maintaining the poor of this town is somewhat more than last year; but it must be borne in mind, that in consequence of the unfortunate state of the country, a larger number have needed aid and assistance, while the prices of most articles needed for their comfort, have nearly doubled. I feel assured that very few, if any, that have needed assistance have been refused, while doubtless some have received that ought to have provided for themselves; but we must adapt ourselves to cases as they occur, and cannot always satisfy

ourselves if we would, why the applicant is in distress. All I care to know for the time being is that immediate assistance is required, and sometimes find myself overcharitable.

The number of persons and families helped outside of the poor house is 67.

You will herewith find a statement of the products of the farm, and also an invoice of the stock of the farm, provisions and furniture.
